

## **Jeff Moore Biography**

Jeff is currently the head coach at Tabor Academy. In his first season at Tabor, he led the program to their best record since 2016 (7-2), playing in a New England Bowl Game. This season they averaged over 43 points and 335 rushing yards a game, the most in over 20 years. Moore served as the Tight Ends Coach and Recruiting Coordinator at the University of Massachusetts. Under his leadership, Tight End Josiah Johnson was named second team All Independent while being second among Independent tight ends in receptions. The first UMass recruiting class under Moore was their highest rated recruiting class in school history, according to 247 Sports.

Prior to UMass, Moore served as the Head Football Coach at the Loomis Chaffee School taking the school from a 1-8 record, before he arrived, to a 9-1 record in just two seasons. He guided the Pelicans to a school-record-breaking season including single season wins, points scored, passing yards, sacks, TFLs, and total yardage. His final year they won the New England and Founder's League Championships, a massive achievement considering it was the first time Loomis Chaffee had ever been to a bowl game. Of Loomis Chaffee's 22 starters, 20 of them were named first or second team All Founder's League including the two Co-Defensive Players of the year and one of the Co-Lineman of the Year. During Moore's time at Loomis, more than 30 of his players have gone on to play college football with more than 25 at the Division 1 level. Moore has also coached at the St. Thomas More School. There, he inherited a team that was 5-34 the prior five seasons; he led them to back-to-back 6-3 seasons—their best consecutive seasons in over a decade.

Moore began his coaching career in the NESCAC and Ivy League. He spent a year as the Defensive Coaching Intern and Video Coordinator at Yale University under Tony Reno. Moore worked with the Defensive Backs including All Ivy Cole Champion. His first job was at Amherst College working for Coach EJ Mills. During his two years there, their record was 15-1 winning the NESCAC each year.
